AFPA members now have free access to the Australian Police Journal (APJ) both as a hard copy and online.

Since its inception in 1946, the APJ has been a publication with the philosophy of being 'written by police for police'.

Articles in the APJ are written by police all around the world (both serving and retired), unsworn employees, public safety officials, academics or anyone with a legitimate interest in law enforcement matters. AFPA members are encouraged to contribute articles to the APJ, and can be provided with editorial assistance to assist in readying an article for publication.

APJ articles cover a range of issues in policing and law enforcement. In the past, high-quality coverage provided by the APJ has included:

- the important role played by police during natural disasters
- information on organisations that work to advance the profession of policing
- stories on serious crime, including gang warfare and drug busts
- police-related policy issues, such as ideas on how to improve road safety
